I can't believe it is already October—it certainly feels a lot more autumnal outside! October is Black History Month so each class has begun a series of lessons and activities 'shining a light' on a particular personality or event associated with black history.

Our assembly on Wednesday was led by 1H and 2M—they shone a light on Mae Jamieson (first Black female astronaut) and Mary Seacole (a nurse in the Crimean war). We were all inspired by their incredible stories.

EYFS celebrated the start of Black History Month with a special assembly and an afternoon of themed activities. They had a delivery of Ghanaian food from local black business 'Accra Palace' (restaurant on Upper Clapton Road) and enjoyed tasting plantain, jollof rice and beans.

Meanwhile, there has been lots of other exciting learning going on! 6P took part in a P4C session (Philosophy for Children) in which they engaged in a philosophical enquiry and came up with some big, engaging questions which were open to examination, further questioning and enquiry in response to a stimulus of an image of Ancient Greek enslaved people.

2M are reading a book called 'Look Up!' and have enjoyed writing activities linked to the story. They have been learning to use verbs and have even created their own star constellation pictures too.

This week 4B were learning how to write using alliteration, onomatopoeia, and similes to create their own magical poems about potions. They also be made their very own slime potions!

In literacy, 1H have been studying a book linked to their topic called 'The Night Pirates'. In science they have been using their classifying skills to group animals based on what they eat.

Meanwhile, as part of their humanities topic, 3T have been learning about Stonehenge and enjoyed building their own versions of Stonehenge out of clay.

It was great to see a number of our parents/carers at the PTFA (Parent's Teacher's and Friends Association) AGM meeting on Thursday. If you missed the meeting but would like to support the school in this way, please do get in touch.


