Introduction

Harrington Hill Primary School is a multicultural school and we are very proud of the cultural harmony that exists. There is an assembly each day, which is non-denominational and is a very important part in the life of the school.

Assemblies contribute to the individual's personal and spiritual development as well as the social and moral values, which we consider to be part of the ethos of the school. The Senior Leadership Team and teachers, as well as guest speakers and visitors from the local community, lead the assemblies. We have a weekly achievement assembly which celebrates children's efforts, attendance and excellent behaviour.

Aims

- 1. To allow all pupils to reflect on their own values and beliefs as well as those of others
- 2. To celebrate our diverse community through a shared vision based on common values
- 3. To reinforce spiritual and moral elements of the curriculum to improve learning
- 4. To celebrate and share academic and social achievements

It is the statutory duty of the school to provide a daily assembly for registered pupils. Parents have the right to withdraw their child from assembly and should inform the Headteacher in writing if they wish to do so.

Excellence Assembly Guidance

- -Each week, the following week's Focus value is introduced by the staff member leading (linked to Oracy homework task).
- -Each teacher gives out a focus value certificate to one child in their class.
- -Two additional certificates are awarded per class: 1) Learning Behaviour 2) An excellent piece of work (can be linked to Oracy).
- -Playground award certificates are prepared by the Learning Mentor and read out by the member of staff leading the assembly
- -Each week, 3 pupils with 100% attendance and no lates are selected to receive a prize. The class with the highest attendance for the week receives the attendance trophy to display in their classroom until the following week.
- -Staff have the option of nominating a colleague to receive a Staff Champion certificate (linked to one of the school values).
